To Surrender a pet, or Drop off a homeless animal:

1. Provide a history if possible.
2. Show a Driver's License indicating residency.
3. \$10.00 fee.

To Adopt a pet for their forever home:

1. Get acquainted with the potential pet.
2. Provide an adoption fee to cover related expenses, ie: Spaying, if necessary.

To Volunteer time at the shelter:

1. Fill out an application, indicating what you might enjoy doing, ie: walking dogs, spending time with the Cats/Kittens, miscellaneous tasks around the office, and shelter building, etc.
2. Participate in an orientation.

To temporarily Foster an animal:

1. Fill out an application.
2. Participate in an orientation.

Donations of dog and cat food, litter, towels, blankets etc. are always appreciated. Also, monetary donations are very welcome.

LATEST HISTORY:

In 2018, Cumberland County built “The Adoption Center”, which houses the animals awaiting their forever homes, and the welcome area for visitors. **In 2019**, FOCCAS built the “Intake Building”, which was paid for entirely from donations, and money raising activities over the course of many years. Animals brought to the Shelter are quarantined in this building, until healthy, and ready for adoption, then, they are moved to the Adoption Center.

Mission Statement:

To make a difference in our community by rescuing as many abandoned cats and dogs as possible, in order to grant them the chance to live the lives they have been given. To educate the public on the need for spay and neuter, humane care, and the unconditional love that these animals have to offer in exchange for offering them a safe haven in their homes and hearts.

A.A.R.F. is a small group of volunteers with a passion for animals. It is their goal to save as many lives as they can from needless death. They are a foster based animal rescue organization. They save animals from high risk situations, such as over full animal shelters, and local strays from counties who do not have the luxury of an animal shelter. In addition to their adoption program, they work closely with many local animal shelters to ensure that dogs are not euthanized for space.

In 2012 they started the AARF Freedom Ride Transport Program which relocates homeless animals directly from our local animal shelters to guaranteed adoption facilities in the north, who need a wider variety of breeds of dogs to attract adopters into their shelters. This program has proven successful in reducing euthanasia of canines in our local shelters.

A.A.R.F. is operated out of our volunteers' homes. We are **ALWAYS** in need of foster parents to help save more lives. To become a foster parent, the only true requirement is that you love animals as much as we do, and treat your foster animals as if they were **your own**.

Trap Neuter Release Program:

TNR is the only humane and effective way of reducing the feral cat population. A group of feral cats living in a location is called a colony. Our program assists colony caretakers with spay/neuter costs, and colony care advice.

Barn Cat Program:

If you need financial assistance with spaying or neutering an animal, you can call and leave a message with Wags and Whiskers. They will return your call, and ask for information from you. They will also send a list of veterinarians, with contact information, and pricing.

Then, you will make an appointment with the veterinarian, and notify Wags & Whiskers of your name, the veterinarian's name, and the appointment date.

Wags & Whiskers will supply a voucher for the medical service.

Wags and Whiskers Pet Rescue, Inc. was founded in April 2004 to prevent cruelty to animals.

In the spring of 2010, they replaced their rescue-foster-adopt model and started doing business as "Wags & Whiskers Spay/Neuter Advocates".

They raise funds to provide financial assistance for spay/neuter of community animals and administer a spay/neuter agency in cooperation with local veterinary practices.

GOALS:

Humanely reduce the homeless cat population in Cumberland County, primarily through – Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return. The mission -- to help cats that are abandoned, born in the wild, or continue to reproduce, causing a critical situation.

The rescued cats are neutered, given medical care, if needed, and socialized. They're fostered until adopted by appropriate local or out-of-state adopters.

The cats that are feral and cannot be socialized are returned to a safe location, usually feeding stations.

HOW TO VOLUNTEER:

1. Foster families are needed while rescued cats are awaiting adoption.
2. Drivers are needed to drive to vet appointments.
3. Kennel custodians and feeders can assist at the rescue building.
4. Volunteers are needed to feed the community cat colonies in the area.
5. Office workers can help in their homes.
6. Building and repairing feeding stations is needed.
7. Help with fundraising.

ANY MONITARY DONATIONS WOULD BE GREATLY APPRECIATED.

(In 2021 the all-volunteer group became a registered non-profit.)
